OUR PHILOSOPHY

While the work of Carl Jung is most commonly associated with the symbolic realm of the psyche in the second half of life, his early recognition of the importance of the mother and infant relationship is less well known. Michael Fordham and Erich Neumann, two of Jung's followers, sought to expand Jung's concepts of the self and individuation to include the beginnings of life and childhood. The foundation of the iCAT Program is grounded in the study of the infantile self, and its maturation in childhood and adolescence through the process of individuation.

iCAT is a comprehensive two-year program designed to prepare analysts and candidates for specialization in analytical work with children and adolescents. Trainees will receive continuing education credit for their participation in monthly seminars. At the completion of the program, trainees will also receive a certification in Jungian Child and Adolescent Analysis from the C.G. Jung Institute of San Francisco.

YEAR ONE

The first year of training introduces Tavistock Infant Observation to enhance analytical skills. Included in this experiential component are weekly in-home infant observations followed by monthly Infant Observation Seminars.

YEAR TWO

The second training year focuses specifically on the theory and range of practice in Jungian child and adolescent analysis with a rich curriculum of Jungian and post-Jungian readings. Clinical case conferences and individual case supervision are ongoing for the duration of the program.

APPLYING TO ICAT

We welcome applicants who have graduated from Jungian analytical and other psychoanalytic institutes all over the world. We also accept current candidates from IAAP approved Jungian institutes. pleted her psychology post-doctoral fellowship at Children's Hospital at Stanford, Department of Child Psychiatry, and served as Caregiver Coordinator of the Infant and Toddler Program at Children's Health Council. She co-leads Infant Observation groups in the iCAT program, China and Taiwan.
